2023 HIGHLIGHTS THE CENTER'S SUCCESSES

During the **2023 NFJE Annual Symposium**, held in July in Washington, D.C., the Center sponsored a panel discussion on "Improving Rule 702." The Center panel explained how the amendment to Federal Rule of Evidence 702 will strengthen the role of the court as gatekeeper for the admissibility of expert opinion. The panel, which was moderated by Center President **Phil Willman** (*Brown & James PC*), included **Lee Mickus** (*Evans Fears & Schuttert LLP*), past Center and DRI President **Toyja E. Kelley** (*Locke Lord LLP*), and **Elyse Shimada** (*Hollingsworth LLP*).

During DRI's 2023 Annual Meeting, attendees joined the Center for stand-out sessions, including an in-house panel discussion about the plaintiffs' bar's most rampant abuses, their impact on the legal industry, and how the defense bar can respond. "Legal System Abuse: An In-House Perspective" was moderated by then-DRI President-Elect Patrick Sweeney (Sweeney & Sheehan) and featured speakers Lisa Bellino Apelian (Zurich North America), **Andrew Pauley** (National Association Companies), Konrad Pilatowicz (U-Haul Insurance International, Inc.), and Stef Zielezienski (American Property Casualty Insurance Association).

Thanks to then-DRI President **Lana Olson** and Center Vice Chair **John Guttmann** for their October 16, 2023, testimony before the Advisory Committee on the Rules of Civil Procedure in support of proposed amendments to FRCP 16 and 26 regarding privilege logs and proposed FRCP 16.1 regarding MDL proceedings, respectively. They elaborated on the Center's recently filed comments on the proposals. Many thanks also to **Greg Farkas** (Franz Ward) and **Jeff Holmstrand** (Grove Holmstrand & Delk) for serving as primary authors of the Center's comments on

FRPC 16 & 26 and FRCP 16.1, respectively.

Congratulations to **Marta-Ann Schnabel** (O'Bryon & Schnabel PLC), who chairs the Center's Nonlawyer Ownership of Law Firms Task Force, as well as task force members **Susan Gunter** (Dutton Brock LLP) and **Tom Hurney** (Jackson Kelly PLLC), for winning the **2023 G. Duffield Smith Outstanding Publications Award** for their work on the 2022 Center white paper, **Nonlawyer Investment in the Legal Economy**! The award honors the best writing published by DRI in the previous calendar year. The trio also put on a webinar, **Nonlawyer Investment in the Legal Economy**, as a follow-up to the white paper of the same name. This webinar, **now available to members** via DRI's on-demand library, outlines the major regulatory changes in several U.S. states that now permit nonlawyers to own law firms.

The Center is proud to support its ADR Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Initiative and its goal of increasing diversity inclusion among neutrals in underrepresented categories. On November 29, during the DRI Insurance Coverage and Practice Symposium in New York City, the initiative attracted a packed room of engaged symposium attendees who wanted to learn about what this group is doing to increase diversity among neutrals appointed to insurance-related disputes—and how their organizations can get involved. 2023 HIGHLIGHTS THE COMMITTEE AND SUBCOMMITTEE SUCCESSES



Amicus Committee

The Center's <u>Amicus Committee</u> prepares amicus curiae briefs on behalf of DRI in carefully selected cases that present issues of extraordinary importance to civil litigation defense lawyers, their clients, and the civil justice system. DRI may participate as amicus curiae at either the certiorari stage or the merits stage in cases pending before the U.S. Supreme Court, and occasionally files in federal court of appeals cases. Requests for amicus support in state appellate courts are referred to the appropriate State and Local Defense Organization (SLDO) for possible collaborative filings.

New Appointments, Subcommittees, and Task Forces

The Center is **pleased to announce** new leadership appointments to its Amicus Committee, including new Chair Lisa Baird (Reed Smith) and Vice Chair Melinda Kollross (Clausen Miller). DRI and the Center wish to thank Matt Nelson (Warner Norcross + Judd LLP) for his years of service as chair of the Amicus Committee. Matt, who now serves on the DRI Board as Central Region Director, will continue to serve as a member of the Amicus Committee. Also in 2023, the Amicus Committee launched two new subcommittees: Appellate Skills Development and Appellate Litigation Issues & Trends, the former of which is chaired by past DRI president and current Amicus Committee member Mary Massaron (Plunkett Cooney) and comprised of current Amicus Committee members Chad Pekron (Walmart Inc.) and David Axelrad (Horvitz & Levy), past DRI President Henry Sneath (Houston Harbaugh), and DRI member Jeff Doss (Lightfoot Franklin & White).

Other Recent Amicus Activity

In August, the Center filed a brief with the United States Supreme Court in *Loper Bright Enterprises, et al. v. Gina Raimondo Secretary of Commerce, et al.,* No. 22–451. The brief, which was authored by Melinda Kollross and Don Sampen of Clausen Miller P.C., was filed in support of the petitioners but took the position that a federal administrative agency's authority should be tested under the "major questions doctrine" rather than the traditional *Chevron* doctrine.

In November, the Center joined the brief of the Atlantic Legal Foundation in Medical Marijuana Inc., et al. v. Horn, urging the Supreme Court to limit civil RICO's scope.

In December, the Center joined the Colorado Association of Defense Lawyers brief to the Colorado Supreme Court in Antero Treatment LLC v. Veolia Water Technologies Inc., seeking to protect contractual expectations via proper application of the economic loss rule.

Also at the end of 2023, the Center <u>filed a brief</u> with the U.S. Supreme Court in *Photoplaza v. Herbal Brands*, which involves the exercise of specific personal jurisdiction over corporate defendants that sell products online. *Melinda Kollross* and *Michael Raudebaugh* of Clausen Miller authored the Center's brief in support of the cert petition. The Center also <u>filed a brief</u> on the merits in *Bissonnette v. LePage Bakeries*, which involves the breadth of the Federal Arbitration Act's exemption regarding interstate commerce. The brief was authored by **Sarah Elizabeth Spencer** of Christensen & Jensen and was joined by the Atlantic Legal Foundation.



Legislation and Rules Committee

The Legislation and Rules Committee works directly with policymakers to appropriately represent the views of the defense bar and to protect the integrity and fairness of the civil justice system. This can take various forms, including providing testimony, public comment, counsel, and research to elected and appointed officials and government agencies. Where the issue arises on a state or local level, the Committee works closely with the relevant SLDO to provide assistance, resources, and counsel. The Legislation and Rules Committee includes task forces on Class Actions, Medicare Secondary Payer, and Federal Rules, State Legislation and Rules, Multidistrict Litigation, and ALI.

New Appointments, Subcommittees, and Task Forces

Brooks Magratten (*Pierce Atwood*) was **appointed Vice Chair** of the Center's **Legislation and Rules Committee. Robert E. Johnston** (*Hollingsworth LLP*) was appointed to serve on the committee.

Greg Farkas (Frantz Ward LLP) is now a member of the Center's **Federal Rules Task Force**.

Past DRI and Center President Toyja Kelley (Locke Lord) was appointed chair of the MDL Working Group, with Darleene Peters (Irwin Fritchie) serving as vice chair. Other members of the working group include Carlos Benach (Irwin Fritchie), Ryan Clark (Lewis Thomason), Jeff Holmstrand (Grove Holmstrand), Anita Modak-Truran (Butler Snow), Torrey Peterson (Shook Hardy), and Rob Wise (Nelson Mullins).

The **State Legislation & Rules Task Force** was launched to provide support to SLDOs by assisting, upon request, SLDOs interested in evaluating, supporting, or opposing potential legislation or rules affecting their members and clients and supporting SLDOs interested in promoting legislation or rules adopted in other jurisdictions. The task force is chaired by **Brooks Magratten** (*Pierce Atwood*).

With current representation in 19 states, the task force is looking for members from other jurisdictions to join the effort. Current representation includes Arizona (Sarah Wolfe - U-Haul), Colorado (Brandon Hull - Overturf McGath Hull), Illinois (Henry Goldman -Wiedner & McAuliffe), Iowa (Josh Strief - Elverson Vasey), Louisiana (Francine M. Giugno - Kelley Kronenberg and Taylor Brett - Adams & Reese), Massachusetts (Kyle Bjornlund – Cetrullo LLP), Maryland (John Sly - Waranch & Brown LLC), Missouri (John Reeves - Reeves Law LLC), Nebraska (Kerri Snowden - Farmers Mutual of Nebraska), New Jersey (Mike Malia - Peri & Stewart LLC), New York (Claire Rush - Barry McTiernan & Moore and Steve Dyki - Westguard Insurance Co.), Ohio (Anne Marie Sferra - Bricker Graydon LLP), Oklahoma (Kari Hawthorn - Johnson Hanan Vosler Hawthorne & Snider), Pennsylvania (Lisa Bellino Apelian - Zurich North America and Jason Banonis - Marshall Dennehey), Rhode Island (Brooks Magratten - Pierce Atwood), Texas (Slater Elza - Underwood Law Firm), Utah (Sarah Elizabeth Spencer - SpencerWillson PLLC), West Virginia (Michael Schulz - Babst Calland), and Wisconsin (Nicole Marklein - Cross Jenks Mercer & Maffei LLP).

Other News

The Center has <u>testified</u> and actively supported amendments to Federal Evidence Rule 702, seeking clarification of how courts should address the issue of whether an expert is qualified to offer opinions and whether the basis for the opinion is sufficient to allow the opinion and data to be admitted. On July 20, 2023, the Center held a <u>free webinar</u> briefing DRI members on this amendment, how it should be used in federal court, and how this clarification of Rule 702 can also be used to control expert testimony in state courts. On December 1, several amendments to the Federal Rules of Evidence took effect, including the changes to Federal Evidence Rule 702.

Launched on December 1, "Don't Say Daubert" is a joint project of Lawyers for Civil Justice, DRI, International Association of Defense Counsel, and Federation of Defense & Corporate Counsel, dedicated to reforming federal and state civil rules governing the admission of expert evidence in civil courts.

The Center also recently joined <u>a coalition comment</u> to the Supreme Court of Ohio's Commission on the Rules of Practice & Procedure in support of a proposed amendment that would align Ohio Rule of Evidence 702 more closely with its updated federal counterpart, Federal Rule of Evidence 702, 2023 Amend. (effective Dec. 1, 2023).

The Center's State Legislation and Rules Task Force is <u>ready to work with</u> any SLDO interested in proposing or supporting amendments to their state legislation or rules consistent with the changes to Federal Rule 702. To learn more, <u>read the Rules Package for the Rules of Evidence</u> and <u>copy of the new rules</u> reflecting what has changed.

Notably in 2023, at the request of the Defense Association of New York, the Center submitted a letter to New York Governor Hochul's

office in support of DANY's opposition to the enactment of proposed amendments that would expand who is eligible to seek damages for pain and suffering (i.e., NY's "Grieving Families Act"). On January 30, Governor Hochul vetoed the enactment of the amendments.

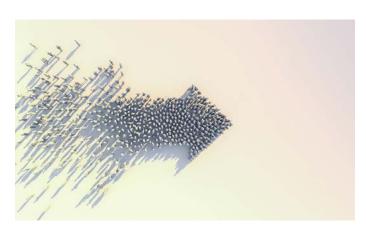
The Center's MSP Task Force held an MSP 101 webinar, which addresses Medicare Secondary Payer fundamentals that every claim professional and defense attorney should know. In this course, MSP Task Force members John Cattie (Cattie and Gonzalez) and Bruce Cranner (Milling Benson Woodward LLP) walk listeners through a refresher on all things MSP. DRI members can access this webinar on demand through the DRI Learning Center.

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has finalized and published the rule, for Section III reporting, specifying how and when it will calculate and impose civil monetary penalties (CMPs) when Group Health Plan (GHP) and Non-Group Health Plan (NGHP) Responsible Reporting Entities (RREs) fail to meet their

Medicare Secondary Payer (MSP) reporting obligations. To assist DRI members and their clients, the **MSP Task Force** published a **detailed summary** of the newly published rule, which took effect on December 11, 2023.

Finally, the **MSP Task Force** has new leadership. **Judy O'Grady** (*Pepper Hamilton*) is now task force chair and **Barrye Miyagi** (*Taylor Porter*) is now vice chair. Many thanks to **John Morganstern** (*O'Hagan Meyer*) for his years guiding the task force, which he will continue to serve as immediate past chair.

The Center has also <u>submitted a letter</u> to the **Judicial** Conference's Committee on Rules of Practice and Procedure proposing that Federal Rule of Appellate Procedure 29(a) be amended. The Supreme Court recently amended its Rule 37, effective January 1, to eliminate the consent/permission requirement for both petition-stage and merits-stage amicus briefs.



Public Policy Committee

The <u>Public Policy Committee</u> is charged with examining topics that are of importance to DRI members and seeks to identify and respond to issues that threaten the ideal of fundamental fairness and the very practice of law itself. Its task forces and working groups examine policy issues of broad applicability as requested by the DRI Executive Committee and the Center's Management Council. They generate white papers for publication, present at DRI meetings and seminars, and work with SLDOs as they face important policy questions. The **Public Policy Committee** includes task forces and working groups on social inflation/legal system abuse, artificial intelligence, data privacy and protection, third-party litigation funding, nonlawyer ownership of law firms, and climate change and sustainability.

Herrin** (*Herrin Health Law*), **Maxwell McDaniel** (*Modern Woodmen of America*), **Richik Sarkar** (*Dinsmore & Shohl LLP*), **Tobias Schelinski** (*Taylor Wessing*), and **Henry Sneath** (*Houston Harbaugh LLP*). **Laura Clark Fey** (*Fey LLC*) serves as chair of the working group.

Inc.), Shari Belitz (Shari Belitz Communications LLC), Michael Callahan (Eversource Energy), Jeffrey Ditmar (Atain Insurance), Collin Hite (Markel, Inc.), Catherine Leatherwood (Rogers Townsend LLP), Claire Maisano (Evert Weathersby Houff), Juan Marquez (Rodey Law Firm), Eric Passeggio (Sulloway & Hollis PLLC), Peter Querubin (TM Claims Service, Inc.), Mahima Raghav (Zurich Insurance Company), and Jim Robinson (Hite Fanning & Honeyman).

Danielle M. Waltz (Dinsmore & Shohl LLP) was appointed as vice chair of the Center's **Third-Party Litigation Task Force**. Joining Danielle are new task force members **Pat Eckler** (Freeman Mathis & Gary) and **Michael Goodin** (Zurich Insurance Company). The task force is chaired by **David Levitt** (Hinshaw & Culbertson).



AMICUS WINS IN 2023

In 2023, the Center filed numerous amicus briefs where the court issued an opinion adopting the position advocated by and in alignment with the Center, including in:

- The U.S. Supreme Court supporting the petitioner in <u>Dupree v. Younger</u>, No. 22-210. <u>The brief</u> was authored by <u>Matthew T. Nelson</u>, <u>Charles R. Quigg</u>, and <u>Katherine G. Boothroyd</u> of <u>Warner Norcross + Judd LLP</u>. The Court agreed with the Center, holding that a post-trial motion under Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 50 is not required to preserve for appellate review a purely legal issue resolved at summary judgment.
- ◆ The U.S. Supreme Court where certiorari was granted in Acheson Hotels, LLC v. Laufer. The brief in support of certiorari in this case, involving ADA "test" litigation and standing, was authored by Sarah Elizabeth Spencer of Christensen & Jensen Attorneys and Center Chair and Atlantic Legal Foundation Executive Vice President & General Counsel Larry Ebner. This brief was quoted in an article published on Law360.com. The Center subsequently joined the Atlantic Legal Foundation's brief on the merits in Acheson Hotels, LLC v. Laufer.
- The Supreme Court of New Hampshire in <u>Brown, et al. v. Saint-Gobain Performance Plastics</u>. The brief, calling for the rejection of claims for medical monitoring absent present physical injury, was authored by **Mary Massaron** of *Plunkett Cooney*, filed by the Center, and joined by the Tri-State Defense Lawyers Association and the Washington Legal Foundation.
- ◆ The U.S. Supreme Court in *Coinbase, Inc. v. Bielski*, where the Court ruled 5–4 in favor of Coinbase, Inc., thus allowing Coinbase to continue its effort to compel arbitration against members of a putative class action lawsuit, meanwhile halting the lawsuit's progress through the federal court system. The Center had previously filed an *amicus brief*, authored by *Sarah Elizabeth Spencer* (*Christensen & Jensen Attorneys*), advocating for the ruling that the Supreme Court issued.
- ◆ In the Colorado Supreme Court, where the Center joined a successful coalition amicus brief—filed by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and joined by the Colorado Association of Defense Lawyers, among others—in In Re Antero Treatment LLC. The case involved a constitutional challenge to a statutory appeal bond cap enacted by the Colorado legislature, which would limit the amount of an appeal bond to \$25 million regardless of the size of the verdict. On December 4, the Colorado Supreme Court issued an order determining that Colorado's appeal bond cap statute is indeed constitutional and rejecting all of the challenges to both the statute and the trial court's application of the statute in this case. The brief was authored by DRI member Lee Mickus of Evans Fears & Schuttert.

NONLAWYER INVESTMENT IN THE LEGAL ECONOMY

One of the most important functions of DRI is research on issues of importance to the defense bar. This research is generally carried out by the Center and is embodied as either background materials or a more formal white paper. Either can serve one of two purposes depending upon DRI's institutional perspective. One, on an issue in which DRI takes no formal position, they provide information background to educate our members on the topic allowing them to form their own conclusions. Two, on issues in which DRI has taken an organizational position, they form the intellectual basis for DRI's advocacy.

The Center's latest white paper, Social Inflation – Legal System Abuse, addresses social inflation and legal system abuse. Produced with strategic partner National Association of Mutual Insurance Companies (NAMIC), the paper examines and recommends model rules that courts are using to increase transparency and help level the playing field.

The Center joined a coalition of organizations as signatories to <u>a</u> <u>letter to the Committee on Rules of Practice and Procedure</u> in further support of the pending proposal to amend Fed. R. Civ. P. 26(a)(1)(A) (v) that would mandate disclosure of third-party litigation funding (TPLF) agreements. **David Levitt** (Hinshaw & Culbertson), Chair of the Center's Third-Party Litigation Task Force, subsequently submitted a <u>supplemental letter</u> to the committee to provide additional considerations consistent with the positions advocated for in the Center's white paper, Third-Party Litigation Funding: Civil Justice and the Need for Transparency.

In the September issue of For The Defense, Chris Turney (Turney LG), who chairs the Center's Social Inflation Task Force, also teamed with task force member Eric Passeggio (Sulloway & Hollis) to publish "Anchoring a Verdict Without Angering the Court," which assessed a recent Supreme Court of Texas holding that made the most definitive rejection of the practice of damages anchoring to date.

They were joined in the September FTD by fellow task force member Lisa Bellino Apelian (Zurich U.S.), whose article "The Cost of Doing Business: Jurisdiction by Consent Under Mallory v. Norfolk Southern Railway Co." discussed the overwhelming implications and "intolerable unpredictability" resulting from the U.S. Supreme Court's recent opinion.
